The aim of this work, named Mary Shelleyś Romance in the Gothic Concept Perspective: Frankenstein or Modern Prometheus Novelis to examine the first step of the process of transforming from a freak formed by the dilemma of creative-creation relations in 18 century into an iconic popular culture component today. The Role Of Human Treaing In Reducing Aviation Accidents And Incidents

Keywords: Human Factor in Aviation, Human Training, Aviation Safety, and Regulation

Differences in aviation safety records around the world should be minimal or nonexistent considering the global nature of aviation. However, significant differences exist and the reasons for those require the attention of governments, regulatory agencies, aircraft manufacturers, airlines and the flying public. Since the beginning of aviation, human error has been recognized as an important factor in air accidents and incidents. Controlling and avoiding human error is one of the biggest problems in the aviation industry and is still ongoing. The decreasing number of accidents is in line with the downward trend that started since 1960. The introduction of jet engine, advances is in flight simulation, crew resource management (CRM), and aircraft technological development have contributed significantly to aviation safety. In 2017, the worlds airlines carried a record 4.09 billion passengers. There were 13 fatalities and 2 fatal accidents in 2017. The two fatal crashes this year both involved regional airlines. Air transportation has become the safest mode of transportation in terms of fatalities per distance travelled. While mechanical failure, weather conditions can play significant roles in commercial aviation accidents. Aviation accidents due to human errors are by far the most common cause of accidents and incidents. In recent years, aviation safety measures have been taken to focus on pilot training program, focusing on engineering and operational practices, which in turn have led to relative success in reducing the incidence of events. In the next section we provide a review of the literature. This study focuses on the relationship between human factor and aviation accidents or incidents. Findings support the idea that in general, accident rates decrease as investment in training increase. According to Boeing, about 80 percent of commercial airline crashes to human error. Anecdotal evidence indicates that there may be significant differences in the training practices among various regions of the world, and one might argue that when an airline invests in Human Factors, Safety Culture it might also mitigate the risk of accidents. Overall, the study will determine that if proper investments are made for training with interface technology significant benefit would be enjoyed in the form of higher safety.

Socio-Demographic Factors Associated with Childhood Obesity

Introduction: The rising trend of childhood obesity is an alarming public health problem. Early identification of the socio-demographic factors associated with obesity in children is vital to target the children who are at an increased risk of obesity and future co-morbidities. The objective of this study was to identify the socio-demographic factors associated with childhood obesity. Methods: A cross-sectional study which included a total of 245 children aged between 5 to 12 years old. These children were recruited from the paediatric wards in a local hospital following parental informed consent. Each child had body mass index (BMI) calculated. They were then classified into either normal or overweight/obese group (BMI; 85th percentile). The parents responded to self-administered questionnaires which assessed the socio-demographic details, lifestyle and environmental information. Data were analyzed using SPSS. Results: One hundred and fifty-seven participants (65.2%) had normal BMI while 88 subjects (34.8%) were classified into overweight/obese group. A total of 83.4% were Malays, 5% were Chinese, 8% percent were Indians and the remaining were other races. Socio-demographic factors analyses showed that families with higher household income tend to have children with significantly higher BMI compared to those with lesser income (p=0.029). Having a family history of diabetes and obesity increases the risk of children to have higher BMI. Conclusion: Higher household income and family history of diabetes and obesity are associated with increased risk of childhood obesity. Identifying the socio-demographic factors associated with obesity in children may help in targeting the high risk group and further help reduce the risk of obesity and the associated complications.



Influencing Factors on Performance of the Intentional Rounding in the Tertiary General Hospital Ward Nurse

The purpose of this study was to examine the effects of perceptions of patient rounding, self-leadership and nursing organization culture on Intentional rounding performance, and provide basic data necessary for the development of educational programs to promote Intentional rounding. The participants of this study were 210 nurses who had experience of patient rounding care in the general hospital wards of B city and Y city. The data were collected from February 5, 2018 to February 22, 2018, with the approval of the Institutional Review Board of the Hospital of P University. The collected data were analyzed by descriptive statistics, 2-test, and independent t-test using SPSS 23.0 for windows. Logistic regression analysis was performed to identify factors influencing Intentional rounding performance.
